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## Comparing ‘Chapter 1: Sustainable development and financing for development’ of Rev. 3 with Rev.2

### ABOUT:

*The Zero Draft of the Pact for the Future was released on January 26th, 2024, marking the start of formal negotiations in preparation for the Summit of the Future (SOTF) scheduled for September 2024. A chapter-by-chapter first reading in early February led to a compilation text, followed by a paragraph-by-paragraph second reading from late February through April. A revised compilation text was then circulated on April 3rd, 2024. To align with the Membership's goal of making the Pact for the Future more concise and action-oriented, Rev.1 was issued on May 14th. The second revision, Rev.2, was subsequently released on July 17th, 2024, followed by the third revision Rev-3 on August 27th, 2024. This bulletin will focus on ‘Chapter 1: Sustainable development and financing for development’, comparing Rev-2 and Rev-3 to provide detailed insights.*

### METHODOLOGY:

This ICH bulletin has compared Rev.3 of the Pact for the Future with Rev.2. The content from Rev.3 and Rev.2 are included in columns 1 and 2, respectively. The third column on “Observations” was written by the Lead Author based on the revised texts and understanding gained by tracking the SOTF negotiations. Direct quotes from the text drafts have been put in quotation marks.

### HEADLINES:

- Language on reaffirming the “people-centred” nature of the 2030 Agenda has been added to Chapter 1 in Rev.3.
- In paragraph 20 of Rev.3 there has been the addition of language that explicitly references groups of developing states “in particular African Countries, least developed countries, landlocked developing countries, small island developing States, as well as those with specific challenges, including Middle Income Countries and countries in conflict and post conflict situations”.

- In paragraph 21 (b), there has been the addition of language on “well-designed, sustainable and efficient social protection systems for all that are responsive to shocks” to strengthen the end of the paragraph.
- Action 3 of Rev.3 has added language on “all forms of malnutrition”, which did not feature in Rev.2.
- In paragraph 23 (h), the term “tax avoidance” has been deleted in Rev.3.
- In paragraph 23 (k), the language on financial support to developing countries has been strengthened with the additions of language on “including by promoting inclusive and innovative finance mechanisms and partnerships” and “through the catalytic use of public financing” in Rev.3.
- In paragraph 25 (d) there has been the addition of language on “modern energy for all and increase substantially the share of renewable energy.”
- In paragraph 25 (e), the phrase “regardless of their migration status” has been added to Rev.3.
- Action 7 has been strengthened with the addition of language on “and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions”.
- Action 8 on gender equality has been weakened from “as essential prerequisites to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals” to “crucial contribution to progress across all the Sustainable Development Goals and targets”.
- Paragraph 27 (d) has added language on “the need to strengthen support for institutions in relation to gender equality and the empowerment of women” at the end of the paragraph.
- Paragraph 27 (e) has added language on “equal rights to economic resources, as well as access to ownership and control over land and other forms of property, financial services, inheritance, natural resources, and appropriate new technology, in accordance with national laws” for women.
- Paragraph 27 (f) has provided a standalone paragraph on “sexual and reproductive health and reproductive rights as agreed in accordance with the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development and the Beijing Platform for Action and the outcome documents of their review conferences”.
- The cluster on climate change under Action 9 and paragraph 28 has been strengthened with the addition of new paragraphs on:
  - Setting “a new collective quantified goal (NCQG) from a floor of USD 100 billion per year, taking into account the needs and priorities of developing countries” at COP 29.
  - Paragraph 28 (d): “Significantly enhance international cooperation and the international enabling environment to stimulate ambition in the next round of nationally determined contributions.”
  - Paragraph 28 (e) on “the development, transfer and deployment of clean and renewable energy technologies” and “and transition away from fossil fuels”.

- Paragraph 28 (f) on adaptation finance that “will have to be significantly scaled up beyond the decision to double adaptation finance” and “scaling up the provision and mobilization of new and additional grant-based, highly concessional finance and non-debt instruments”.
- Paragraph 28 (g) to “Further operationalize and capitalize the new funding arrangements, including the Fund, for responding to loss and damage.
- However, in paragraph 28 (h), there has been the deletion of language on “promote a disaster risk-informed approach to sustainable development that integrates disaster risk reduction into policies, programmes and investments at all levels” which featured in Rev.2 but not in Rev.3.
- Paragraph 31 (a).
- Is verbatim paragraph 28 (a) of Rev.2 with the addition of “including through strengthening the role of the High-level Political Forum on Sustainable Development (HLPF) as the main platform for the follow up and review of the sustainable development agenda” in Rev.3.
- Paragraph 31 (b).
- Is based on paragraph 28 (b) of Rev.2. The language has been reformulated to “Invite the HLPF” to consider in September 2027 how we will advance sustainable development by 2030 and beyond.
- Paragraph 31 (a) has been strengthened with the addition of language on “strengthening the role of the High-level Political Forum on Sustainable Development (HLPF) as the main platform for the follow up and review of the sustainable development agenda” in Rev.3.
- Paragraph 31 (b) has been reformulated to “Invite the HLPF” to consider in September 2027 how we will advance sustainable development by 2030 and beyond.
